


## **Underrepresented Minority**<sup>a</sup> Students in ATE: 2013

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According to the results of the 2014 survey of ATE grantees, underrepresented minority (URM) students comprise 48 percent of all students in ATE-supported programs. By discipline, the percentage of students from underrepresented minority groups ranges from 29 percent to 66 percent.
